

Callers Corner

Callers Corner Ralph Price

WHAT DOES THE FUTURE HOLD?

In my mind, the above question applies to old time square dancing, fiddling and the old time music jams/dances that Sandy and I regularly attend.

We retired in 1999, moved from Scarborough and built our dream home in Horseshoe Valley, about 80 miles North of Toronto. In 2000, Sandy embarked on a "bucket list" item of learning to play the fiddle as her father had done when she was growing up in Nova Scotia. This led us to start attending fiddle club old time music jams/dances and gave us the exposure to the old time dances and square dances.

I remembered square dancing from my school days going back about 50 years then. Since I'm not particularly musical, there was no hope of me learning to play an instrument, but I thought, I can square dance again. I found there were lots of "widow" ladies who were more than happy to re-acquaint me with the square dancing.

After a couple of years, I started looking at the ages of the "callers" and thought "who is going to do this when they are gone"? I wondered, could I learn to call? I talked with many of the callers and they were more than happy to lend me or give me square dance books. So, I set out to see what I could do.

One advantage I had, is that I was not afraid of a microphone. When I worked, I had to address large meetings and I had done race commentary at sports car races at various tracks in Ontario and Ouebec. These days, I've been known to say "I never met a microphone I didn't like". In 2004, I started working on learning calls and honed my skills at the various fiddle club jams/dances around. In 2007, I was encouraged to join COTSDCA and was accepted as a "Caller" member. Here we are 12 years later and still at it.

Sandy and I have travelled all across North America, from Nova Scotia, to Arizona, to Alberta and attended fiddle and square dance events along the way, as well as many in Ontario every month. What we notice, is that participation has gradually fallen off at local events, including the COTSDCA dances and the same at out of province events where we have gone more than once. Also, many of the jam/dances have folded because of lack of attendance or the organizers got too old to do it and no one else would take it over. Look back at your last issue of the Olde Tymer, where in 1992 there was a list of 35 square dance events. How many today? Further, the average age of the current participants just keeps getting older. People pass away or lose their mobility and very few new people come along to replace them. Our activities don't seem to attract

"new and younger blood"! Why not?

Most of us come from a generation where we had to make our own fun and entertainment. People today are accustomed to having their fun and entertainment presented to them on internet and TV. the their "smartphones". Our idea of "friends" is people we see face to face and dialogue and participate with them, rather than a "friend" on Facebook. Further, I don't believe square dancing is taught in the schools now.

In 5 years how many old time square dances and fiddle club music jam/dances will there be? In 10 years will there be any?

WHAT DO WE DO?

I DON'T THINK I HAVE ANY MAGIC ANSWERS, BUT I DO HAVE SOME IDEAS!

1) We have to promote our activity. You can get free advertising in Community newspapers, but you have to ask for it and/or write an article for them. If you don't ask, you don't get. The Association should be collecting e-mail addresses from non-members so that they can communicate with them about upcoming events. At our dances, put out copies of the latest "Olde Tymer", so that non-members can pick them up and see what they are missing. When we are in the Maritimes at events, the latest issue of the Maritime Fiddlers Association quarterly newsletter is usually there, so that non-members can pick it up. We get ours by mail as Sandy is a member of the MFA.

2) We have to teach square dancing! If we teach it, we must give the people the opportunity to put into practice what they have learned. How be we start our dances at 7PM and for the first hour we teach new people the basics, with the regular dance starting at 8PM as it does now. We usually walk people through each dance, so that together with knowing the basics, should get them off on the right foot.

3) Where we have new people like that, encourage them to split up and dance with an experienced couple who will also split, so that you have knowledgeable people guiding the rookies. If they have fun and don't feel lost, they will come back.

4) Try not to have too many novices in one square, especially if they are friends. They will want to talk with each other and will miss calls.

5) Encourage people to bring out their children and grandchildren. A number of people we see at the jam/dances are bringing their grandchildren. Pair them with an experienced dancer and they do fine and really seem to enjoy themselves. At the dance on January 5th, I saw a lot of new faces and some younger people, even some teenagers. Who were they? How did they come to be there? Who encouraged them to come? How can we ensure they come back and bring others?

6) If you are experienced dancers, bring your friends. If they don't know how to dance, teach them the basics before you come and then do as I noted in 3) above.

7) Older experienced dancers need to be tolerant of inexperienced people who make mistakes. With that in mind, take the novices to the fiddle/club jam/dances and hone your skills there. Most of the dancers there are not particularly skilled and are very forgiving and do all they can to help and encourage newcomers.

8) What can we do to put our hobby out there in the mainstream somehow or other? I've got a few thoughts in this area and intend to explore them in the next few months .I'll work on them and let you know how they go in a future issue of the Olde Tymer.

(9) How many "caller members" go out to the music jam/dances in your area on a regular basis? At the events we go to in our area, the people I see are Ernie Shoebridge, Ray Avery, David Lancaster and myself. When we are out there, we are always promoting square dancing and the COTSDCA dances.

10) Can we get more people from the College Royal coming to our dances? What do we do to promote our events to the students? Should we be holding a COTSDCA dance at the College?

11) If you want to know about the fiddle club jam/dances and places to square dance in Ontario, I publish a monthly e-mail bulletin with a Schedule of Events. Send me an e-mail at ralph.sandyprice@sympatico.ca and I will add you to my mailing list. I've been doing this now for nearly 9 years, with the view of encouraging people to get out there to dance, play the fiddle and have fun. A lot of people tell me they really appreciate it.

Well, I think that is enough from me for now and my comments, suggestions and ideas are all put forth with the focus of "how do we get and keep people coming to our dances, so that this great hobby can continue".
