Vice Presidents Report

The onset of the Corona virus pandemic has caused us to become very aware of the behaviours which can easily transmit an undesirable danger to another person. In light of this heightened awareness, we will be reviewing the behaviours we routinely engage in during our dances.

One infected person with a cold, flu, or other contagious illness could potentially transmit it to every person attending the dance. Since the very nature of square dances involves changing partners with multiple frequent hand contact, as well as changing the mix of people in squares between dance sets, a bacteria or virus on one infected person's hands could be present on everyone's hands by the end of the evening.

A virus, as with most illnesses, can be contagious for some time before you even have symptoms, or some have may never significant symptoms. The single best practice in preventing transmission of a virus or bacteria, is the frequent washing of hands. Going forward, in the interest of keeping all of our attendees healthy, we want to recommend all dancers to engage in frequent hand washing during dances. To make this practice more convenient, we will be looking at additional measures to alleviate line-ups for the washrooms while still encouraging hygiene and sanitation.

Initially, we felt that the square dance season would resume in the fall, however realistically, that may not be an option. At this time, until further notice, all square dance events are cancelled, however we ask you to please save the dance dates and we will inform you once it is safe to restart. As always, if you are not well, or have other symptoms that could be contagious, please avoid attending dances to prevent the risk of spreading the illness.

Ralph Price sends out a monthly email about fiddle jams and dances in the surrounding areas; all have been cancelled. If you would like to subscribe to receive these notices, please email a request to him directly:

An Old-Time Music Journey

From the Buttonville W.I. to the ONTRAD Library

In the late 1970s, I was a fledgling guitarist and button accordion player, just starting to learn the ins and outs (so to speak) of traditional music. I had lately moved from the small town of Waterford, Ontario to the big city of Toronto. Once there, it didn't take me long to gravitate towards others of my kind, most importantly to piano and banjo player, Kate Murphy and fiddler. Anne Lederman, with whom I started the folk group Muddy York.

Kate was already involved with the old-time square dance scene at that point, playing with fiddlers like Ted Sinoski, and Tommy McQueston and with callers like Walter Cosburn, Alex Mulligan, and Jack Hayes. Over the next little while I was lucky enough to join her as a guitarist in trios with Ted and Tommy, playing venues ranging from the in Buttonville Women's Institute Hall to The Royal Ontario Museum. A few years after that I played guitar along with fiddler Dave Weir for weekly square dance classes taught every Tuesday night by Jack Hayes at Central Tech School on Harbord St. There I got to watch Jack teach all the old dances, and sometimes adapt new ones on the spot for whatever odd number of people might have shown up for the class that night. I also got to hear a lot of great stories of the old-time fiddlers, callers, dancers and dance halls all over Southern Ontario.

I can't begin to say how grateful I am for the education I got from these players, (and others) many of whom were decades older than I was. I learned tunes and dances that most musicians my age had never heard of, - The Roberts, The Jessie Polka. The Navy Two-step and the like. These tunes still live on in my repertoire along with a million other jigs and reels, old parlour ballads, folk songs and sea chanties. I don't play them all that often these days, but it's great to have them there when I need them - and its lots of fun to be able to teach them to others. I recently found a brand-new way to do this.

The ONTRAD Library

After forty years of collecting and playing early Ontario music in many different forms, I found I was regularly being asked about it by a lot of people. Partly just to avoid getting tired of answering questions, I put together the Ontario Traditional Music Library (ONTRAD Library) a free-access website of Ontario traditional songs and dance music for the use of musicians, students and museum workers.


At the core of the ONTRAD Library are the digitized contents of my collections (and parts of my brain). It includes hundreds of entries of songs, fiddle music, stories and other folklore. There are recordings, photos, reference material and sheet music that can be accessed - and more than a few old-time Ontario dance tunes and calls.

The Ontario Old-Time Square-Dancing community has been very helpful in finding information and photos of folks like Tommy McQueston and Jack Hayes and examples of the music they played and dances they called. You can find all this and much more at <u>www.ontariotraditionalmusic.ca</u>.




Cover of Cornhuskers' Square Dance book - 1930s
